Saint John Paul II (1920 – 2005)

Today, Pope Francis will canonize Pope John Paul II as a saint. This is a monumental event, because most of us lived through the pontificate of John Paul II, and many remember him as the only pope for a very long time.

John Paul II was one of the most influential leaders of the 20th century. He supported the Second Vatican Council and its reform, and held firm orthodox Catholic stances on doctrine. He is known for his implementation of several papal teachings pertaining to the role of the Church in the modern world.


He was one of the most travelled popes in history, visiting 129 countries. As part of his emphasis on the universal call to holiness, he beatified 1,340 people and canonized 483 saints, more than the combined tally of the preceding five centuries. He also named most of the College of Cardinals, consecrated or co-consecrated a large number of the world's bishops, and ordained many priests.

John Paul II's cause for canonization commenced in 2005 shortly after his death with the traditional five year waiting period waived. On 19 December 2009, John Paul II was proclaimed Venerable by his successor Pope Benedict XVI and was beatified on 1 May 2011 after the Congregation for the Causes of Saints attributed one miracle to him, the healing of a French nun from Parkinson's disease. A second miracle, attributed to the late pope, was approved on 2 July 2013 and confirmed by Pope Francis two days later. John Paul II will be canonized on 27 April 2014, along with Pope John XXIII.

Saint John XXIII (1881 - 1963)

Pope John XXIII was the fourth of fourteen children born to a family of sharecroppers that lived in a village in Lombardy. He was ordained a priest in 1904 and served in various posts including appointments as papal nuncio in France, and delegate to Bulgaria and Greece. Pope Pius XII made him a cardinal in 1953 naming him Patriarch of Venice and Cardinal-Priest of Santa Prisca.

He was elected pope on 28 October 1958 at the age of 76 after eleven ballots. Pope John XXIII surprised everyone by calling the historic Second Vatican Council (1962–65). However, he did not live to see it to completion, dying on 3 June 1963 of stomach cancer, four-and-a-half years after his election. His feast day is celebrated on 11 October, the day of the opening of Vatican II.
