Exaltation of the Cross
According to legends the Cross of Jesus was re-discovered by Saint Helena, the mother of the Emperor Constantine, while on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem in 326. The Church of the Holy Sepulcher was built on the site. The date of this feast, September 14th, marks the dedication of this church in 335.

The Seven Sorrows of Mary

Midway through September, we celebrate the Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows on September 15th. It immediately follows the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross on the 14th. The devotion known as the Seven Sorrows of Mary (not to be confused with the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary) originated some time in the 13th century with the Servite Order.

The Seven Sorrows of Mary are:

1. The Prophecy of Simeon. (Lk 2:34-35)
2. The Flight into Egypt. (Mt 2:13)
3. The loss of the child Jesus in the Temple. (Lk 2:43-45)
4. Mary meets Jesus on the way to Calvary.
5. Jesus dies on the cross. (Jn 19:25)
6. Mary receives the body of Jesus. (Mt 27:57-59)
7. Jesus's body is placed in the tomb. (Jn 19:40-42)

The Chaplet of the Seven Sorrows is prayed by meditating on each of these and praying 1 Our Father and 7 Hail Mary's.



The Priest Must Serve God and the People

When he celebrates the Eucharist ... [the priest] must serve God and the people with dignity and humility ... by his bearing and by the way he says the divine words he must convey to the faithful the living presence of Christ. -GIRM 93

The importance of the priest's participation in the Liturgy, especially by singing, cannot be overemphasized. The priest sings the presidential prayers and dialogues of the Liturgy according to his capabilities, and he encourages sung participation in the Liturgy by his own example, joining in the congregational song. -Sing to the Lord 19



St. Michael and the Archangels

The Prayer to Saint Michael was added by Pope Leo XIII to the prayers after Mass in 1866. The practice of reciting these prayers ended in 1964. Blessed Pope John Paul II referred to the St Michael prayer in 1994, saying: "I ask everyone not to forget it and to recite it to obtain help in the battle against the forces of darkness and against the spirit of this world."

The words to the prayer are as follows:

Saint Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle; be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him, we humbly pray: and do thou, O Prince of the heavenly host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.
