And 10 of these sick guys come to Jesus, and Jesus heals them. But not right away.

First he sends them to work their way back into the community, and on their way ... they're healed.

And how many of these guys come back? All of 'em? None of 'em?

Right. One of them.

That's not very good. We should try to thank God for all the good things we receive, whatever they are.

Now, for those of you with animals - where do you take them when they're sick?

A Vet?

Today's Veteran's Day. Is that a doctor who helps sick animals?

No?

What's a Veteran?

Someone who served their country in the military - Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, or Coast Guard.

And, do you know what today is? It's the feast of St. Martin of Tours. St. Martin was a soldier in the Roman Empire back 1,000 and then some years ago.

When he was in the military, he wasn't a Christian yet. But he had a helmet, and armor, and a sword, and a cape ... and a HORSE.
