MASS STIPENDS AND PRAYER INTENTIONS

From the very beginnings of the Church, it was customary for the faithful to donate the bread and wine to be used in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. In time, offerings of money were substituted for the actual bread and wine. Money given in excess of what was necessary for the procuring of the bread and wine was used to assist the poor and, eventually, to support the clergy.

It became customary for the priest to accept from the faithful a donation (called a "stipend") in return for remembering a specific intention in the celebration of a Mass. Through this voluntary offering, the donor seeks spiritual benefits that God may bestow upon the persons or concerns that are specially held in prayer at the Mass. What is more, Church law notes that the donor himself benefits: "Christ's faithful who make an offering so that Mass can be celebrated for their intention contribute to the good of the Church, and by that offering they share in the Church's concern for the support of its ministers and its activities."

The Mass "is quite properly offered according to apostolic tradition not only for the sins, punishments, satisfactions and other needs of the faithful who are living, but also for those who have died in Christ but are not yet fully purified". The deep faith and ardent charity of the parishioners of a parish manifests itself in the numerous Mass offerings made for the living and deceased.

In our diocese, it is the custom for the parish which supports the priest financially to receive the Mass stipend. Priests who are retired or are not assigned to a parish may accept stipends; or a priest may accept a stipend when visiting another parish or diocese.

When a parish accepts a Mass stipend, they set up an agreement to pray for an intention at a specific Mass. The priest-celebrant prays for that intention specifically, but that does not nor can it preclude him from also praying for other intentions as well.

All participants at Mass, including the priest, may, and hopefully will, not only pray for their own intentions at Mass, but also for the intentions of all present; as well as for the needs of our world,

> Church, and local community. Each of the Eucharistic prayers have within them prayers for various intentions, and the Prayer of the Faithful does as well. Mass is always offered for many intentions.

> Pastors are "obliged to apply a Mass for the people (*pro populo*) entrusted to his care on each Sunday and holy day of obligation". Take consolation in the fact that every weekend and holy day of obligation a Mass is offered for all of you who are members of our parish.

At St. Elizabeth, Mass intentions are offered for both the living and the dead. One weekend Mass is for the parishioners, and the other is for a particular intention. Our weekday Masses are also offered for particular intentions as requested by parishioners.

The customary stipend for a Mass is \$10. However, this is not an obligation and is waived for those who cannot afford the offering.

In situations where an individual desires to have a Mass offered, but does not want the intention pub-

licized, the custom is to list "For a special intention." This is a wonderful way to apply the infinite graces of the Mass to our needs, both spiritual and physical.

Masses may be offered for the deceased, but also the living. Occasions such as birthdays, anniversaries, surgeries, going on a pilgrimage, or leaving home for college can all be lifted up in our prayers at Mass.

Mass intentions may be scheduled by calling the parish office.
